RETROSPECTIVE OF 25 YEARS OF PERFORMANCE



FROM THE ARTISTIC DIRECTOR

Thank you all for coming tonight to share in the celebration of 25 years of the Judy Dworin Performance Project (JDPP) at this premiere of *Lighthouse.* You are the reason and the purpose behind this work - without you, it would not happen. So it is fabulous that you are here.

I first developed Lighthouse in 1986 following the passing of my father. This earliest version explored. through the metaphor of the lighthouse, what happens when pivotal connections in our lives are broken—how do we/can we find that 'light' in some way again? I was invited to do the piece at Baltimore Theater Project, with a new cast from NYC as almost everyone from the original Hartford cast, was unavailable for the two-week Baltimore run. The piece was extremely well received and it helped me realize that to continue to do this work in an ongoing way. I needed to work with a consistent group of dancers. The approach to devising pieces from improvisational investigation required that kind of continuity-and a special kind of performer who was comfortable being uncomfortable and going deep into her/his own experience to dig up material that might be utilized in the piece. It was very participatory and collaborative and I was the outside eye, conceiving and then shaping it into a whole.

And thus the Ensemble and the nonprofit came into being, first under the name MetaArts and then later Judy Dworin Performance Project. It was the beginning of a full and wonderful, challenging, but totally worth-it-all, journey. The Pump House Gallery exhibit that Associate Artistic Director Kathy Borteck Gersten conceived and recently curated and installed with Board members Amy Goldbas and Robin Cullen, charts the journey so completely. Art and performance has such power to speak out in so many critical and beautiful ways that transcend literal description—it has been a privilege to be a vessel for this work.

I have always imagined bringing a totally re-envisioned *Lighthouse* back at some point in time, to pay tribute again to its powerful metaphor as a beacon in life and as the originating inspiration for all that has followed. JDPP's celebration of 25 years felt like a fitting moment to do so, working with an amazing group of collaborating artists, some completely new partnerships, as with Bob Een, and others renewing rich artistic bonds once again with Marjorie Agosín and Marcela Oteíza. It is an honor to work with each one of them, as well as to sit side-by-side with Kathy in directing Lighthouse - Kathy, who was a stunning performer throughout her many years with the Ensemble and has been a soul mate in this journey for almost 30 years. And to have Lisa Matias, Ensemble performer for these entire 25 years and my student before that, be a pivotal part of *Lighthouse's* unfolding has been terrific as well as working with the newer members of the Ensemble -Mellissa Craig, Christine Perry, Haley Zbeski, James Falcon, Alex Davis and Robert Byrd - with the energy of senior members Tracy Lombardo, Alexa Melonopoulos and Heidi Klecak supporting us always. And of course, my husband Blu - I first collaborated with Blu on the original Lighthouse so many years ago - the beginning of a wonderful life-long partnership -and his keen and singularly magical sense of light has enhanced every piece of ours since then.

In all of this work through the years, I have delved into the darker realms of life as an act of affirmation, as an avenue to help us in our search for light. To create such art is a symbol of hope - that at the end of the struggle and conflict and sometimes deep despair, there is —a light something that we as humans can recognize, listen to and respond to and that leads us to the most essential aspects of our humanity and beyond. *Lighthouse* is about that process. It speaks to us in a time where technology can, if we are not careful, drive us away from that pivotal source rather dangerously, if we do not stop short and take notice.

This evening is offered with love and gratitude for the process of 25 years, and all of the work that has unfolded within those years in so many ways. Thank you so much for being a part of it.

Judy Dworin. Founder (Artistic & Executive Director) Judy Dworin founded the Judy Dworin Performance Project, Inc. (JDPP) in 1989. In addition to her work as Executive Director and Artistic Director of the Ensemble, and helping to build the Moving Matters! Residency Program, Judy conceived and directs the Bridging Boundaries outreach program for those affected by incarceration. This includes a residency at York Correctional Institution for women in Niantic CT, now in its 10th year, where she and her collaborative team lead a performance residency as well as a Moms and Kids outreach and weekend arts engagement. She also leads a comprehensive in school and afterschool program for youth with parents in prison as well as an arts outreach with Trinity College students and women reentering the community from prison affiliated with Hartford's Resettlement House. Judy has taught residencies in Bulgaria and Taiwan as well as throughout New England. She is on the Teaching Roster for the State of Connecticut and is the recipient of many awards, as well as being selected as an honoree for "Voice and Vision" by the Connecticut Women's Hall of Fame. She most recently received the Southside Institutions Neighborhood Alliance Award for service to the community. Her commitment to education has had a forty-three year history at Trinity College, where she established the Dance Program, cofounded the Trinity/La MaMa Performing Arts. Semester in New York City, and chaired the Department of Theater and Dance for many years. She has also helped to spearhead credit-bearing academic courses at York CI. She contributed a chapter to the book, "Performing New Lives: Prison Theatre", edited by Jonathan Shailor. Creating work with the Ensemble has been a central part of Judy's professional life.

Kathy Borteck Gersten (Associate Artistic Director) Kathy is the Associate Artistic Director of JDPP. She is the coordinator for the residency program *Moving Matters!* which has had programs at the Parkville Community School, Burr Elementary School, Kinsella Magnet School for the Performing Arts, Naylor Elementary School and Moylan Elementary School in Hartford, CT, where she also teaches along with the team of JDPP teaching artists and is a guest lecturer in the Department of Theater and Dance at

Trinity College. Kathy is part of the teaching team at York Correctional Institution in Niantic, CT for the performancebased project with the women in addition to the program for Moms and Kids. She has been involved in the program for Youth With Incarcerated Parents since it began in collaboration with Families in Crisis at the Church of the Good Shepherd and has expanded to include A.I. Prince Technical High School, M.D. Fox Elementary School, Movlan Elementary School, and Parkville Community School, Hartford, CT. Kathy received a B.S. with a specialty in Dance from the George Washington University in Washington, DC. Her continued dance studies took her to New York City, Wisconsin and Florida performing with Maida Withers Dance Construction Company, Dance Alliance, Michael Kasper Solos, Merce Cunningham Summer Repertory, Fusion Dance Company, KBG and Dancers and Orion Dance Theater and JDPP. She was a founding member of Dance Services Network, on the Board of the Connecticut Dance Alliance from where she received the Distinguished Achievement Award in 2009 and a Master Teaching Artists with The Office of the Arts for the CT Dept. of Economic and Community Development.

Marjorie Agosín, (Poet for Lighthouse) a poet, human rights activist and literary critic, is the Luella LaMer Slaner Professor in Latin American Studies and a professor of Spanish at Wellesley College. Regarded as one of the most versatile and provocative of her generation of Latin American writers, she has published some 20 books of fiction, non-fiction, poetry and essays. Her interests range from Jewish literature and literature of human rights in the Americas, to women writers of Latin America, to issues of migration, identity, and ethnicity. Well-known as a spokesperson for women in Third World countries. Agosín has won numerous honors, including the United Nations Leadership Award for Human Rights in 1998 and she was recognized by the Chilean goverment with the medal of honor for lifetime achievement in 2001. In 2013, she received the Fritz Reidlich Award for her work on human rights by the Harvard Program on Refugee Trauma and most recently the *Pura Belpre Award* from the Amercan Library Association for her young adult novel *I Lived on* Butterfly Hill. This is Marjorie's second collaboration with Judy, the first being *¿dónde estás?*, a performance piece

about women who protested the disappearance of their loved ones in Chile and Argentine during the military dictatorships of the 70's and 80's. Agosín, whose own family fled from Chile to the United States during that time, wrote the poetic narrative for that piece as well and introduced Judy to many of the surviving activists from that period whom she interviewed when she travelled to Chile and Argentina to do preparatory research for the piece. The piece premiered in Hartford in 1999 and toured to La MaMa in NYC.

Blu (Lighting Design) lived in NYC for 20 years where he was resident designer at the Cubiculo and La MaMa E.T.C., was a Bessie Award winner, and lighting designer for such renowned dance theater artists as Eiko and Koma, Ping Chong, Donald Byrd, Sally Gross, Nancy Meehan and Paula Josa Jones to name a few. He now lives in Bloomfield with his wife, Judy and their family of dogs, turtles, fish, birds, frogs, toads, and bats.

Robert Byrd (Ensemble) is a New Haven native whose love for dance and drama has been instilled and evolving since childhood. Although not ever formally trained in dance, Robert served as member and co-captain of New Haven's Mob Squad Drill and Drum team for over 7 years, where he performed competitively in front of large and small crowds, leading his team to numerous victories. He made his dance debut in JDPP's 2012 production of *In This House*, playing the role of Adam Jackson.

Mellissa Craig (Ensemble) is a first generation American; born into Jamaican parents. She is an accomplished dancer in Modern, African, and Caribbean folk forms, as well as a trained stilt walker. She got her start as a dancer as a Company member with the Cultural Dance Troupe of the West Indies, and pursued dance as an avid hobby and passion starting at age 10. Ms. Craig holds a Bachelor of Science in Biology from Trinity College. For the past 5 years, she has been building a career as a dancer, performer and instructor in the Hartford area. As a founding Company member of Island Reflections Dance Theatre Company, Mellissa has had the pleasure of working along Artistic Director, Stephen Hankey and the other Company members to build a strong foundation in

dance, education, and empowerment for the community of students and families. Ms. Craig is currently employed by the Capital Region Education Council (CREC) as a Core Faculty member at the Greater Hartford Academy of the Arts Elementary and Middle Schools. Mellissa has been a member of Sankofa Kuumba Performance Ensemble for the past 7 years. She is driven by the organizations commitment to authentic art forms from the African Diaspora. She teaches dance, theater and stilt walking and acts as a consultant, and curriculum development specialist for Sankofa Kuumba Cultural Arts Consortium and the Hartford Performs program. Mellissa is a current company member and teaching artist for the Judy Dworin Performance Project and Sankofa Kuumba, and has enjoyed great success in performing and touring throughout CT and New England. She is the proud mother of one son, DeAndre, and would like to one day open her own stilt walking company in the Hartford area in the future. Mellissa's personal philosophy: "I am dedicated to using the arts to make the world a brighter and more enlightened place to live."

Alexander Davis (Ensemble) is a graduate of Keene State College where he studied with William Seigh and Marcia Murdock. Alex has performed and presented his choreographic work at conferences, concerts, festivals, in open fields, art museums, abandoned buildings, street corners, walkways, gardens and (most recently) his mother's kitchen. He has worked with a variety of artists including Betsi Graves, Jessica Muise, Cynthia McLaughlin, Rebecca Stenn, Candice Salyers and Monica Bill Barnes. Alex spends his summers in Durham, North Carolina where he is an administrator for the American Dance Festival. This is Alex's first season with JDPP and he is thrilled to have had the opportunity to work with such a beautiful group of artists. Thank you to Judy for the trust and guidance.

Jeremy D'Entremont (Lighthouse Consultant) is the author of more than 300 articles and 15 books about lighthouses and other maritime subjects. He's the historian for the American Lighthouse Foundation and founder of Friends of Portsmouth Harbor Lighthouses, and he's appeared on national TV and radio speaking about lighthouse history.

Robert Een (Composer for *Lighthouse*) is a composer. singer and cellist. The recipient of an Obie Award for music composition and two New York Dance and Performance Awards (Bessie) for sustained achievement and music composition, Een has performed in theaters, concert halls and unusual venues in some thirty countries around the world, including the Buddhist caves of Ellora, India: the Shinto shrine in Tsurugi, Japan; a theater north of the Arctic circle in Norway; the Pushkin Theater in St. Petersburg, Russia; the Fringe Club in Hong Kong: as well as such storied New York venues as Carnegie Hall, Lincoln Center, St. John the Divine, the Whitney Museum and the Knitting Factory. Known for his use of extended techniques for both voice and cello, he has recorded sixteen albums of genre-bending original music. His scores for film and documentary include; "My Horrible Year" directed by Eric Stoltz, "Mr. Jealousy" directed by Noah Baumbach, "Trouble on the Corner", starring Edie Falco and Tony Goldwyn, and "The Rook", starring Martin Donovan. Een's music is featured in "Ashes and Snow", Gregory Colbert's film and photography exhibit seen in New York. Los Angeles. Mexico City, Tokyo and now on DVD. Robert Een's scores for theater and dance can be heard in the work of Dan Hurlin. Liz Lerman, Brian Selznick, David Dorfman, Pearson/Widrig, Bridgman/Packer, Yin Mei, Jennifer Muller, Yoshiko Chuma and Ron K. Brown, among others. As a teacher he has been a guest lecturer and an artist-in-residence at colleges. universities and professional schools around the globe as well as on the faculty of Marymount Manhattan, UCLA, Naropa University, New York University and UC Santa Barbara. His long association with Meredith Monk culminated in their evening length performance duet, "Facing North". www.roberteen.com

Cyndie Hasty (Vocalist) is a singer-songwriter who was based in NYC for 25 years. Her performances include shows at Lincoln Center, House of Blues and Tribeca Performing Arts Center. She opened for legends Mose Allison and Margaret Whiting, was featured at Harlem Stages in *Two Roads Diverged: A Dialogue on Irish and Black Contributions to American Culture* and sang with Other Voices. Cyndie has recorded three CDs and written a children's cartoon. Her original musical *Children To The Flame* showcased at West Bank Café. As a Pennsylvania Artist-In-Residence, Cyndie co-created Under a Lackawanna Moon with playwright sister, Nancy Hasty. This historical musical, performed in cemeteries, highlighted the plight of working children, immigrants, coal miners, runaway slaves and Civil War heroes. Cyndie now lives in Guilford, CT and is a frequent soloist at First Congregational Church. She was featured in their Joyful Noise Concert Series and commissioned to write songs for the Junior Choir. Cyndie is honored to be a JDPP mentor at Parkville Community School in Hartford.

Chris Hudacs (Keeper voice over and Production Technical Assistant) is a Lighting Designer and Production Manager based outside of Boston, MA. He has assisted Blu on numerous designs and was last heard doing voiceover work for JDPP in the original production of "The Witching Hour". His design work includes productions with: Tiffany Mills Company, Pilobolus, The ART/MXAT Institute, and The Lyric Stage of Boston. He has toured as a Production Manager with Pilobolus, Shen Wei Dance Arts, Doug Varone, David Dorfman Dance, and Stephen Petronio Dance Company. Lisa Matias (Ensemble) received her BA from Trinity College, Hartford, CT., where she was awarded the President's Fellowship in Theater and Dance. She has taught and performed with several companies throughout the Northeast. Lisa currently teaches at Trinity College and at her own studio, Lisa Matias Dance Centre. Lisa has been with the Ensemble of JDPP since its inception and continues to be inspired by Judy's work.

E.M. O'Connor (Translator for Marjorie Agosín's poetry) is a writer and translator. Among her translations include the novel *I Lived on Butterfly Hill* (Simon and Schuster, 2014) by Marjorie Agosín and *Pez/Fish* (Nirala Publications, 2014), a collection of verse by the Peruvian poet Mariela Dreyfus. Her essay "Stitch a Square of Colour on the Darkness: Reflections on Quilting in Ireland" appears in the anthology *Stitching Resistance: Women, Creativity and Fiber Arts* (Solis Press, 2014). She recently signed with the Jennifer Lyons Literary Agency for her first novel, *The Selkie's Daughter*. She has taught literary translation at the Pontificia Universidad Católica de Valparaíso, Chile, literature and Spanish at Lesley University, and currently teaches Spanish at Wellesley College.

Marcela Oteíza Silva (Set Designer) is an Interdisciplinary visual artist and Professor of Theater Design at Wesleyan University Connecticut, USA. Marcela received her BA in Fine Arts at the University of Chile. She earned a MFA in Design for Performing Arts at California Institute of the Arts (CalArts). Her grant awarded pieces are interdisciplinary performances, including collaborations with composers and choreographer to create hybrid works, such as: "The heart play" by Heiner Muller a musicbased dance theater piece (composer Alba Triana) And "Pornographic Angel" with director Claudia Tatinge Nascimento, a digital media and performance play. As a designer she has worked in over twenty productions for Theater and Dance. Marcela has an extensive visual art exhibition record, both in the US and abroad.

Christine Perry (Ensemble) graduated Magna Cum Laude from the Hartt School at the University of Hartford with a BFA in Dance Performance in 2009. During this time she also had the privilege to train at the Martha Graham School of Contemporary Dance on scholarship. She is currently in her 6th season with dancEnlight as a dancer and company teacher. Christine Perry has taught in various schools around Connecticut including Eastern Connecticut Ballet, Premier Dance School and Yale. She is on faculty at the Greater Hartford Academy of the Arts and Limelite Dance Center. Along with dance she is a professional stage and production manager and has done extensive technical theater work in locations including the Baryshinikov Arts Center in New York City, St. Joseph College, the Garde Arts Center, Charter Oak Cultural Center, Foxwoods and the Wadsworth Atheneum.

Joseph Rivers (Sound Designer) is currently, Lead AV Producer at the Museum of Science. Boston. Joe has been involved with the Museum of Science in Boston since 1980 and as Lead AV Producer since 2004. On a daily basis he plays an active role in the conception, production and delivery of audio and video for the museum's web site, lectures, marketing and exhibits. Beyond his work at the museum, Joe has helped produce video for other museums and several documentaries for local historical societies. He has recorded and produced music for several music artists in Boston, New York and Los Angeles. He has also contributed music and audio production for the PBS documentary Splendid Splinters, The Ted Williams Story and has done sound design for Pilgrim Theater (Ashfield, MA), The Plymouth Nation Wax Museum (Plymouth. MA). The Museum of New Hampshire History (Concord, NH) and Playwright's Theatre at Boston University.

Bill Ruyle (Musician) has been a percussionist/composer/ collaborator for new music, dance, and theater in NYC and abroad for over thirty years. He began his career playing percussion at La MaMa for the landmark original production of "Fragments of a Trilogy" (Elektra, Medea, The Trojan Women) composed by Elizabeth Swados and

directed by Adrei Serban. His off-Broadway experience is extensive and includes playing for the original productions of "The Garden of Earthly Delights" and "The Hunger Artist" by Martha Clarke. On Broadway, he has played for the shows "The Pirates of Penzance" (dir. Wilford Leach),"Three Penny Opera", "Juan Darien" (dir. Julie Taymor),"The Secret Garden", "The Green Bird" (dir. Julie Taymor), "Aida", "Big River", "The Boy from Oz", "Wicked", and "Spiderman: Turn Off The Dark" (dir. Julie Taymor). Bill has also played for 8 "Shakespeare in the Park" productions in NYC including, "Cymbeline" (dir. Andrei Serban), "Julius Ceasar" and, "The Seagull" (dir. Mike Nichols). His own compositions have been performed nationally and internationally. Bill has taught in many educational outreach programs including The Music Advancement Program at the Juilliard School, Lincoln Center Institute, and Link Up! at Carnegie Hall.

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
